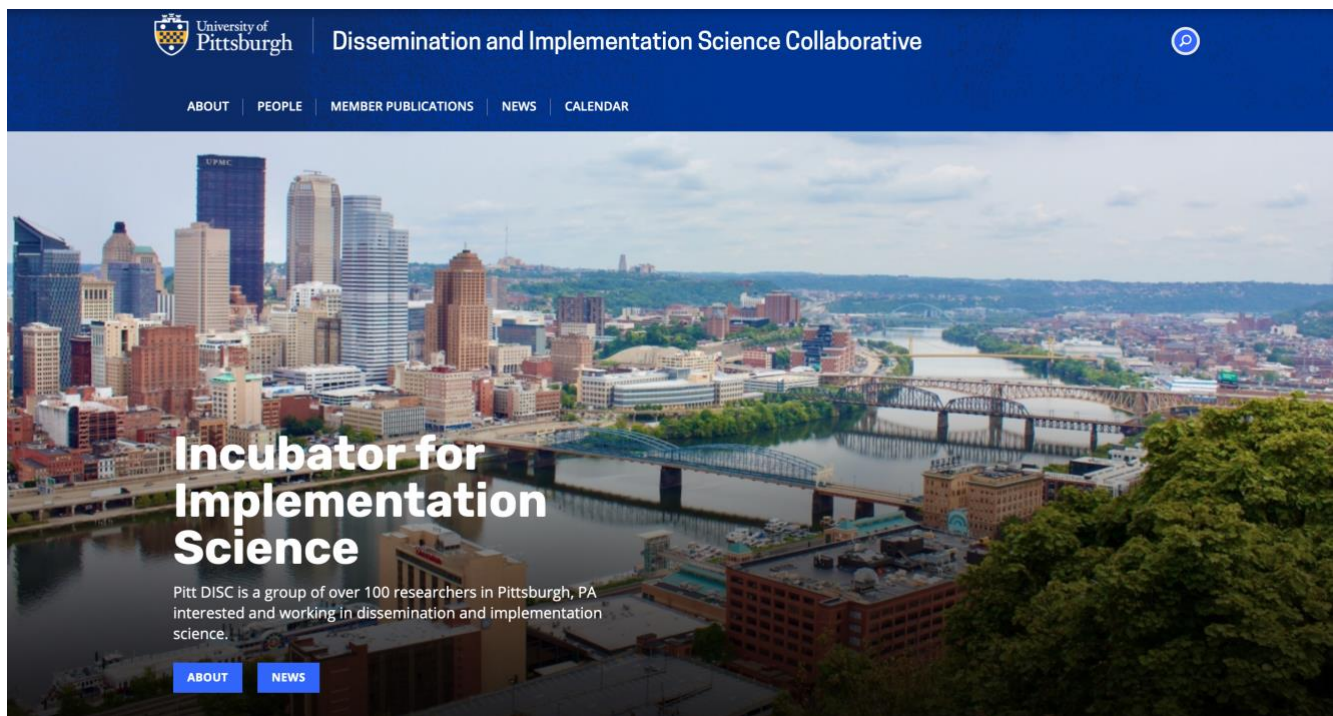
NETWORKING & COMMUNICATIONS

EDUCATION

Lecture Series

Over the course of the year, Pitt DISC hosted six lectures (described in more detail below). The goal of these lectures was, in part, educational and also to bring implementation science perspectives from scientists outside of DISC.

Implementation Science Course

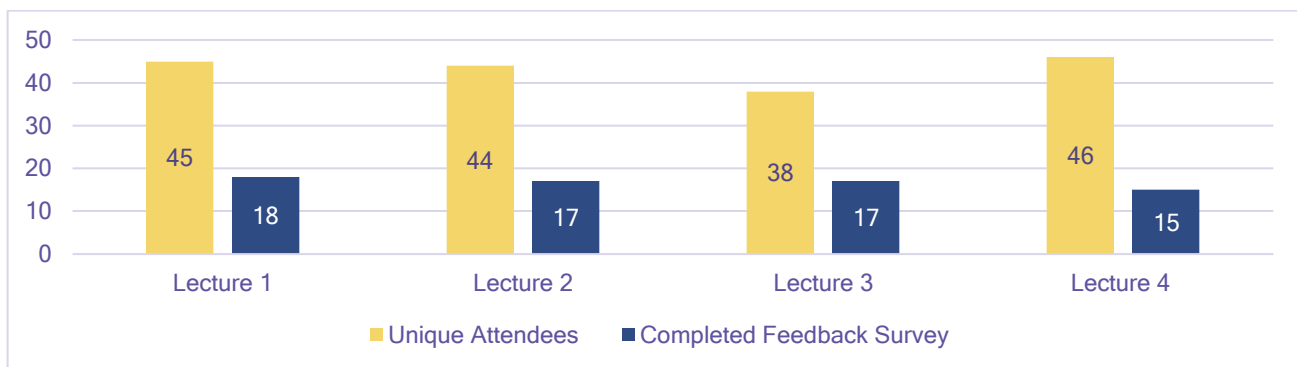
Led by Drs. Charles Jonassaint and Shari Rogal, the ICRE launched a two-part introductory D&I course this spring. Two month-long, twice weekly courses included guest lecturers from across the country, the introduction of a new framework for learning about D&I, and an infusion of tools from Human Centered Design. The feedback from this year was positive and the courses will be offered yearly. As a part of the course development Dr. Jonassaint led efforts to develop online resources and short videos, with the support of the IDEA lab. Be on the lookout for these fun and informative videos!

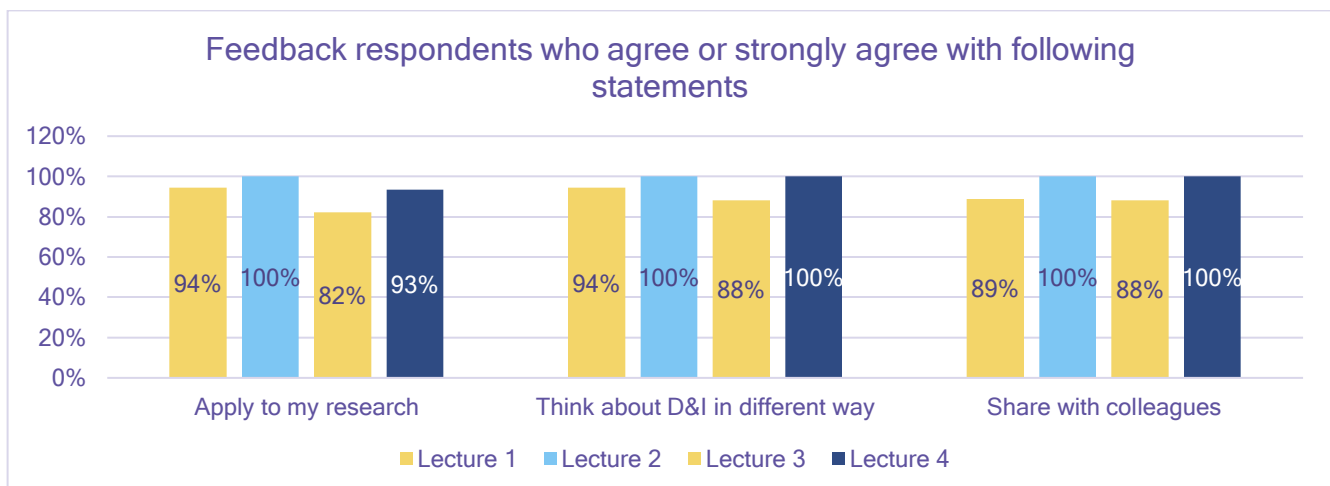

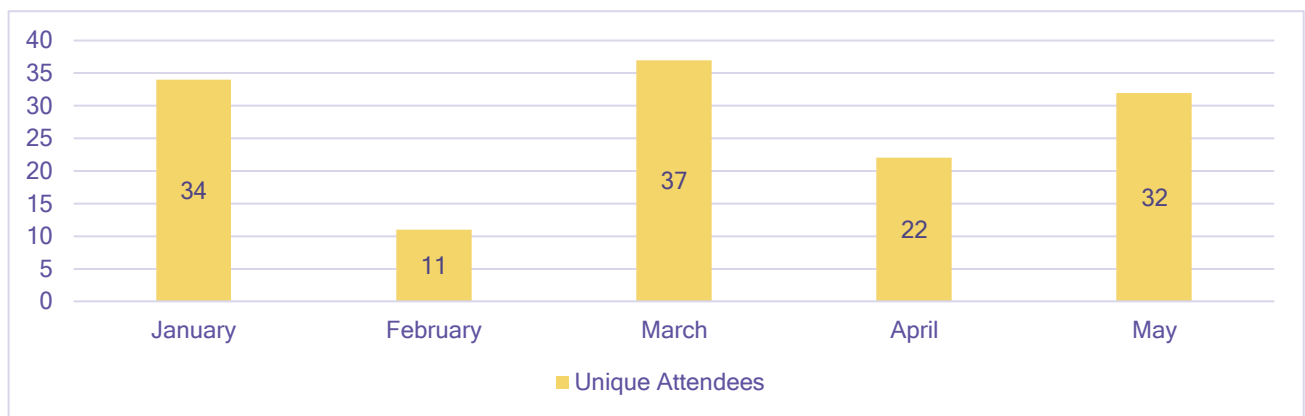

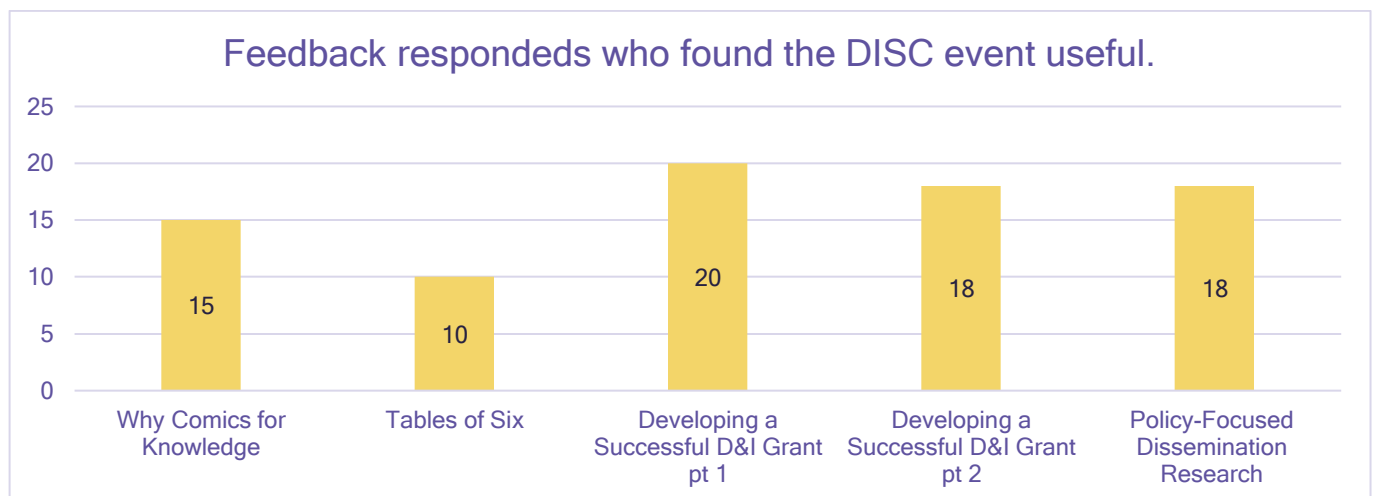

ANNUAL FEEDBACK SURVEY

Overview

The Pitt DISC leadership solicited feedback from members. The Annual Feedback Survey was first distributed on May 14, 2021 via email with two follow-up reminders sent throughout the month of May. 35 DISC members completed the annual survey (28% of membership). The following summarizes responses in the categories of Future Events, Communications, Education, and the overall Future of DISC.

Future Events

The COVID-19 pandemic has changed the format for Pitt DISC events from all in-person events to all virtual events. Participants were asked what event format DISC should adopt moving forward.

- 66% (n=23) Pitt DISC should host both in-person and virtual events.
- 60% (n=21) Pitt DISC events should be simultaneously in-person and virtual.
- 31% (n=11) I prefer virtual but would maybe show up for an in-person event.
- 20% (n=7) I prefer all virtual events.

Pitt DISC members were also asked when they may be ready to attend in-person events.

- 40% (n=14) Probably ready for in-person events in Fall 2021.
- 23% (n=8) Probably ready for in-person events in Spring 2022.

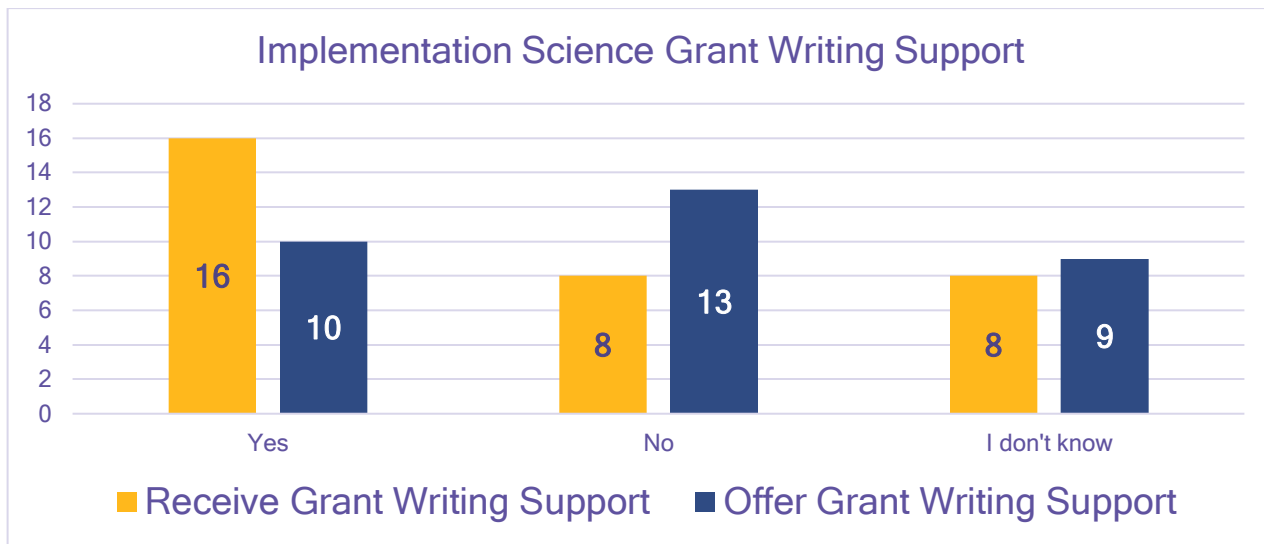
Communications

Participants were asked their perceptions about Pitt DISC communications. 89% (n=31) felt they received an appropriate number of emails from Pitt DISC. Almost all participants (91%, n=32) prefer to receive calendar invites for DISC events. About half of DISC members were mostly ambivalent to the video announcement format (54%, n=19).

Education

Most participants (80%, n=28) had heard of the implementation science course offered through CTSI and most (74%, n=26) would be interested in other implementation science courses offered at the University of Pittsburgh.

The Future of DISC



In the future DISC members would like the following events:

- General D&I Lectures (89%, n=31)
- Advanced Implementation Science Methods (80%, n=28)
- Works in Progress (74%, n=26)
- Networking (63%, n=22)
